



You may not know this, but biblical interpretation is a hot topic among Christians today. The field of biblical interpretation is properly called hermeneutics (pronounced “herm-in-oo-tics”). It answers the question, “What did the author mean when he said this?” You witness hermeneutics every time you hear our pastors preach, during communion meditations, in your smallgroup when Scripture is discussed and when receiving counsel from God’s word. You also practice hermeneutics every time you read your Bible or remind yourself about what God has said. But hermeneutics is not limited to interpreting the Bible. We use hermeneutics every single time we communicate with anyone. The issue is not whether or not we need hermeneutics, but how well we practice this basic human function of language. Since God has communicated with us through His word, the Bible, how we interpret language becomes an indispensable part of the Christian life.

**The Forest and the Trees by Michael Riccardi is an excellent introduction to hermeneutics. Riccardi explains the overarching purpose of the Bible and how to avoid common, modern-day pit falls in interpreting Scripture. This 55-page book will only strengthen your ability to interact with God’s word for your own heart and for the good of others.**
