D1/D2-Heart/Home: The Life of Abigail (I Samuel 25:1-39a)

Wellspring Purpose and Disciplines:

When Reading a Narrative:

- 1. The main character and the "Hero" is always God.
- 2. There are many details that are given in any narrative—but there are also many that are NOT given. We must be very careful not to read more into what is going on than what is written.
- 3. Keep in mind we are reading about real people and real places at a real time in history, and therefore must keep it in historical context.
- 4. Not everything that is written is to be taken as something to apply. It may simply be telling what happened.
